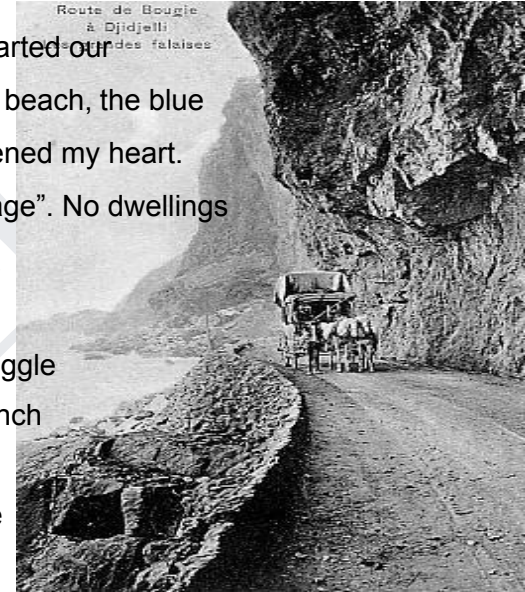
Text: I'm 19 years old. Yesterday dad told us that we are moving a town called "Bougie" in Algeria colonia. I was excited... When we arrived, dad took us

After her death, the village took the name of "Yemma Melbou". According to the old inhabitants of the village, Melbou was a source of wealth for boat builders, because it had a dense forest, rich in wood.
